IMPLICATION OF HMIS (IF APPROVED)

Training

- · Home Project staff will be Home Project staff will be asked to attend a mandatory HMIS training to learn safety protocols and any HMIS related procedures within the system (Training every Friday I-3pm) Will not Implicate HMIS system until ALL staff is trained

Operation at Clinic

- Staff will be trained to look up patients in HMS system when patients enter clinic
 HMS system will be used as a primary source for staff to input and address client needs (client goals, past medical appointments, client service outcomes,)
 Staff will use HMS system to assist other organizations

Maintenance


Logistics Coordinator (Hunter) will be responsible for maintenance of HMIS system ensuring all HMIS privacy and HMIS protocols are followed







THERE WERE 3,542 STUDENTS IN UNSTABLE HOUSING IN SCHOOL YEAR 2022-23*




