

WHAT IS THE PIT COUNT?

The O'ahu Point In Time (PIT) Count is an annual street and shelter count that determines the number of people experiencing homelessness on O'ahu on a single night in January. This project includes a brief survey to identify the needs and characteristics of individuals and families experiencing homelessness. Every Continuum of Care in the U.S. is required to submit PIT Count results to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) as part of a national effort to identify the extent of homelessness across the country.

WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

The PIT Count is an important source of data on homelessness. It is reported to Congress and affects the flow of federal funding to the community. Additionally, the PIT Count is a primary source of unsheltered homeless numbers and helps to inform communities on the number of people who do not access services such as Emergency Shelters or Transitional Housing at any given point in time.

PIT COUNT ON O'AHU

Partners In Care was the lead organization for the Oʻahu 2020 PIT Count. This responsibility included submitting the request to change the methodology, creating a digital survey to collect the data, soliciting volunteers, and analysis of the collected information. The Oʻahu Continuum of Care is a membership organization that is made up of more than 60 agencies who provide services throughout the Island of Oʻahu to those experiencing homelessness. The Count was split among 7 regions across the island based on outreach territories.

IMPORTANT CONSIDERATIONS

The PIT Count is a one-night snapshot of homelessness that is limited by weather conditions, number of volunteers and their training, self-reported survey responses, and other factors. There are more people who experience homelessness over the course of the year than on any given single night. Every year, the Continuum of Care works toward improving the count's accuracy. The O'ahu Continuum of Care is committed to using data from the PIT Count and the O'ahu Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) to understand more about the population experiencing homelessness on island and to provide solutions that will make homelessness rare, brief, and a one-time experience.

Partners in Care's mission is to eliminate homelessness through open and inclusive participation and the coordination of integrated responses.

MAHALO

METHODOLOGY



The Count was held on January 23, 2020 from 4:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m., asking individuals where they slept on the night of January 22, 2020.

- The unsheltered count relies on interviews and observations taken by volunteers.
- The sheltered count relies on data exports from the Homeless Management Information System.
- Capturing a snapshot of the O'ahu population in a short period of time requires months of planning and organization with service providers, government partners, outreach workers, and volunteers. Volunteers included previous volunteers, staff from our partner service agencies and community individuals recruited through news and social media.

2020 Methodology Changes:

- We introduced a mobile app "Survey123 for ArcGIS" - to collect surveys. The app went through several phases of testing and user feedback.
- An Observational Tool was introduced this year to capture individuals who refused to be surveyed, were sleeping, or were inaccessible due to safety reasons. The observational tool is based on HUD's observational tool that captures minimal but highly important demographic information.
- The count took place on one day as opposed to several days over the course of a week as done in previous years. The shortened time-frame and early morning hours align with HUD's best practices and guidelines.


While the 2020 PIT Count was likely not affected by the COVID-19 Pandemic, we recognize that the crisis later affected many individuals, and we anticipate changes to our homeless population in the coming year.

MAIN FINDINGS



Emergency Shelter: Short term accommodations providing shelter to families and individuals. Transitional Housing: Mid-term accommodations, designed to provide housing and supportive services to clients to facilitate movement to independent living. Safe Haven: A form of supportive housing that serves hard-to-reach homeless persons with severe mental illness.

Overall, the total homeless population in the Point In Time Count has not changed drastically over the past two years. After rising steadily from 2011 - 2015, the PIT Count total has decreased by 10% since its peak in 2017.

SUB-POPULATIONS OVER TIME




Veteran homelessness has decreased by 24% since 2015 and by 7% since 2019. Additionally, in 2020, sheltered veterans made up a larger percentage (59%) of the veteran homeless population than unsheltered veterans (41%).

Veteran: A person who has served in the United States Armed Forces. For the purposes of this report we do not distinguish between active duty and non-active duty veterans.

Children Population, 2015 - 2020




The number of children experiencing homelessness on O'ahu has decreased by 45% since 2015 and 8% since 2019. This decrease is largely due to the number of children in shelters decreasing.



The number of individuals in families (families with adults and children) has decreased by 48% since 2015 and 8% since 2019. This decrease is largely due to the number of families in shelters decreasing.

DEMOGRAPHICS



Demographics on all 4,448 individuals are reported here. All percentages are approximates. For exact numbers, please see the appendices.

- The majority of the PIT Count population was male (59%).
- 36% were female and 3% were transgender or gender nonconforming.



Adults: Persons 18 years and older.

TAY - Transitional Age Youth: Persons 18 - 24 years old.

Children: Persons under 18 years old.


Transgender: A general term used to describe people whose gender identity differs from the sex they were assigned at birth.

Gender Non-Conforming: Refers to people who do not adhere to traditional gender roles or stereotypes about how they should look or act based on the sex they were assigned at birth.

732 children were counted in the PIT Count. The majority of these children were sheltered (85%).

The vast majority of individuals were adults (84%) and the majority of adults were single adults (2.562 or 69%).

However, 27% of individuals were in households with children and adults.



^{*} For the purposes of this graph we separated Adults ages 25 years and older from Unaccompanied Youth. For the remainder of the report any reference to Adult will be any persons 18 years old or older.


Household: Any group of individuals that presents together for assistance and self-identifies as a family/household. Single Adults: Person living alone who is 18 years old or older. Adult Only Households: Two or more adults living together with no one under the age of 18. Adult(s) with Children: One or more adults living with one or more children under the age of 18. Unaccompanied Youth (UY): Persons age 24 and under who are not accompanied by a parent, guardian, or household member 25 or older and are not a parent. UY can include single youth, youth couples, and groups of youth together as a household. Unaccompanied Minors: Persons under the age of 18 who are not accompanied by a parent, guardian or household member 25 or older and are not a parent.

RACE & RACIAL EQUITY

Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islanders (NHPI) and Multiracial individuals made up the largest percentages of the PIT Count population. 82% of Multiracial individuals indicated having NHPI racial background. 51% of the overall PIT Count identified NHPI as either their only race or part of their multiracial background.

Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander (NHPI): Person having origins in any of the original peoples of Hawai'i, Guam, Samoa, Micronesia, or other Pacific Islands.

Race/Ethnicity: PIT Count Population




Race/Ethnicity: O'ahu Population

When compared to the overall population on O'ahu, NHPI were overrepresented among the PIT Count population while Whites and Asians were underrepresented.


Racial Equity of 2020 Homeless Population

Comparing the percentage of each of the racial groups on O'ahu to the percentage of each of the racial groups included in the 2020 PIT Count, NHPIs were 2.1 times (or 210%) more likely to represent individuals in the PIT Count compared to the general population of O'ahu. Conversely, Asians were 81% less likely to represent individuals in the PIT Count compared to the general population

12% of the PIT Count indicated Hispanic ethnicity, compared to 10% of the overall O'ahu population.


This section examines characteristics of the 4,448 individuals in 3,187 households counted as either sheltered or unsheltered in the 2020 PIT Count, including 3,716 adults and 732 children.


Homeless: A person who is homeless and lives in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven or in a emergency shelter AND has been homeless for a least 1 vear continuously or on at least 4 or more occasions over the past 3 years that add up to at least 12 months AND has a disability.

Repeaters: Persons who have been counted in PIT Counts 2017, 2018, or 2019.

Mental Health Problem, Substance Use and Disability are classified as a condition(s) that substantially impairs a persons day to day life.





2020 Shelter Type (2,102)


Sheltered Population Changes over Time by Type, 2015-2020






The majority of 2020 sheltered individuals were in Emergency Shelters (62%).

The number of persons in emergency shelters has increased by 30% since 2015, while individuals in transitional shelters has decreased by 61%.



UNSHELTERED POPULATION

This section examines characteristics of the 2,346 individuals in 1,926 households counted in the unsheltered 2020 PIT Count, including 2,238 adults and 108 children.




The majority of individuals counted in the unsheltered count were surveyed.

The unsheltered count has increased by 21% from 2015-2019. However, it decreased by 2% from 2019-2020.

Region 1 (Downtown Honolulu/Kalihi/Nu'uanu) and Region 7 (Wai'anae Coast) have the largest percentage of the unsheltered population.





Region 1 has the highest percentage of the 2020 unsheltered population, and this percentage has increased since 2010. This region also has a smaller percentage of NHPI and Multiracial individuals compared to the overall unsheltered population. This region has the smallest percentage of adults and children in families.











Region 4 had a higher percentage of NHPI and Multiracial individuals compared to the overall unsheltered population. Its adult median age is younger than all the regions except Region 7. Region 4's percent of the unsheltered population has increased since 2010.



While its percent of the unsheltered population is the same as it was in 2010, Region 5 has seen a sharp decrease in its percent of the unsheltered population since 2017. This region also has a higher percentage of Adult Only Households compared to other regions. While NHPIs are underrepresented compared to the overall unsheltered population, Multiracial individuals are over-represented.









Region 7's percentage of the unsheltered population has decreased by 33% since 2010. This region's adult median age is the youngest of all the regions. It also has the largest percentage of adults, children in families, and females. NHPI and Multiracial individuals are over-represented in this region, while Whites and Asians are underrepresented compared to the overall unsheltered population.



DEEPER DIVE: UNSHELTERED SURVEYED

This section examines data collected on 1,272 people in 1,037 households, including 1,218 adults and 54 children. The in-depth surveys offer the chance to examine important individual and system data.

The majority of the unsheltered surveyed (61%) had records in the PIC Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), suggesting that these individuals previously had connections to services and/or outreach.

HMIS: The O'ahu Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) is a countywide software program that is designed to capture client-level information over time on the characteristics and service needs of individuals at-risk of and experiencing homelessness.



Self-Reported Factors Leading to Homelessness (1,218)




The most common self-reported causes of homelessness were financial and/or employment factors. These findings are in line with a recent study of unsheltered homeless in Atlanta that found job loss and financial factors were the most frequently reported causes of homelessness (Barile, Pruitt, & Parker, 2018).

- * Surveyed individuals may choose multiple reasons for currently experiencing homelessness.
- * Loss of money can be many factors including but not limited to loss of wages, loss of job, theft, loss of benefits, and gambling.

Hawaiian Homelands Lease: In order to qualify for a new lease award on Hawaiian Homelands, you must be at least 50% native Hawaiian, and be 18 years of age.




On the Waitlist for Hawaiian Homelands

NEXT STEPS

Continued Research

PIC plans to use 2020 PIT data to explore relevant issues and populations in more depth and to disseminate these findings in a format that will be most useful for service providers and policy makers. In the next year, PIC hopes to:

- Release multiple sub-reports highlighting these findings.
- Develop online dashboards that provide easy access to numbers and breakdowns by region.

PIC also plans to continue using PIT data from the past 4 years to help identify PIT "repeaters" and connect them to services.

PIC will continue to leverage GIS data to assist in COVID-19 planning and prevention on O'ahu.

PIT Count 2021 Planning

PIC is already planning for the 2021 PIT Count. Based on feedback from volunteers, data analysts, and other partners, PIC is considering the following changes and planning for emerging challenges related to the COVID-19 Pandemic.

COVID-19 Impacts. While COVID-19 likely did not impact the 2020 PIT Count, PIC anticipates it will impact the 2021 PIT Count in significant ways, by:

- Increasing numbers of homelessness in the 2021 PIT Count.
 - Researchers project significant financial challenges and increases in homelessness due to loss of jobs, wages, and stability and the inability to afford rent.
- Challenging to PIT Count methodology
 - Depending on COVID-19 spread, canvas counts may not be doable.

One Survey. PIC is exploring the option of using one survey for both sheltered and unsheltered individuals. Currently, only unsheltered individuals complete a comprehensive survey, and sheltered individuals are counted through HMIS data pulls. Moving to one survey will:

- Allow for more direct comparisons between unsheltered and sheltered individuals;
- Shorten the time needed to clean, analyze, and produce data for the public;
- Provide more recent data for sheltered individuals; and
- Will lead to improved data quality overall.
